
Since 1975, the state of Florida has required the phosphate industry to return every acre of land it mines back to productive uses through a process called reclamation.




Hardee Lakes Park is a 1,260-acre site that opened to the public in 2001 after being reclaimed and donated to Hardee County for public use. As part of a Fish Management Area, its four lakes are managed by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission and are open for bank and boat fishing. Hardee Lakes Park is part of the Florida Fishing Trail, also in Hardee County.






Alafia River State Park was donated to the state of Florida in 1996 and opened to the public in 1998. The former mining land has unique topography complete with hardwood forests, pine flatwoods, rolling hills and a multitude of wildlife. At 6,260 acres, much of this land was mined before reclamation was necessary, leaving hills and valleys intact and providing a unique opportunity for some of the best dirt biking in the Tampa Bay region.

## **Bunker Hill Community Park**

35600 St. Road 62, Duette

Draglines mined this land in 2004. Less than a decade later, this 75-acre park welcomes families from near and far. The land was reclaimed and built by The Mosaic Company and deeded to Manatee County in 2011. For access to the 19-acre lake, the park includes an ADA accessible canoe launch and a dock for fishing.

## **Tenoroc Fish Management Area**


The Tenoroc Fish Management Area is an 8,329-acre park forming a continuous linkage of lakes and marshes, open grasslands and wooded hills between the Green Swamp and the Peace River. Its habitats, managed by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, contribute clean water to the Peace River, creating an important refuge for the area's wildlife.
